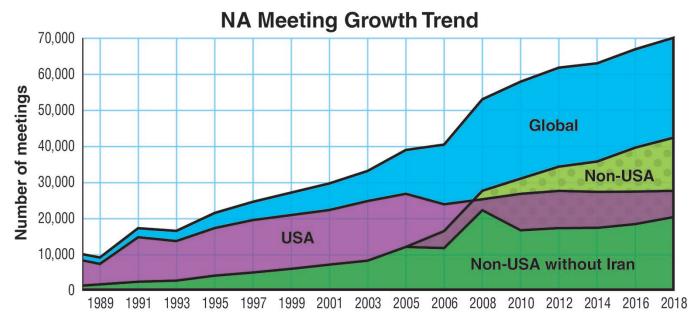
A Note from Your World Board

We say, "Two addicts make a meeting." But hundreds of thousands of addicts worldwide recovering from the disease of addiction in Narcotics Anonymous? That makes a statement. And for more than 65 years, our Fellowship has demonstrated that an addict, any addict, can stop using drugs, lose the desire to use, and find a new way to live. Every day, NA members all over the world are living proof that the magic that's been happening in NA for decades is *still* real.

When we refer to magic happening in NA, however, we're not talking about wand-waving. We're talking about the precise moment when our collective service efforts converge with a using addict's desperation, and the seed of recovery is planted. We're referring to the way decisions at the upcoming World Service Conference will help an addict to find freedom from active addiction 20 years from now. This magic is built into and springs forth from every effort to carry the NA message. The purpose of NA World Services (NAWS) is to support such work carried out by members, groups, and service bodies, and our combined efforts ensure the continued growth of Narcotics Anonymous. We are humbled by this incredible opportunity to serve, and we remain committed to providing the highest quality service and support possible to the Fellowship of NA.

As NA grows, our message continues to find its way across new borders, reaching different language groups. Thanks to this collective and tireless pursuit of our primary purpose, NA is now a global Fellowship with more than 70,000 meetings in 144 countries, with literature translated into 56 languages. And while we translate our message into many different tongues, we all become fluent in a common language: the language of NA. The Basic Text refers to it as "that wordless language of recognition, belief and faith . . ." We experience the language of NA with all of our senses and understand it on a cellular level. It's expressed in a hug given to a newcomer and voiced in a group conscience guided by a loving Higher Power. The language of NA expresses myriad ways in which one addict helps another. It's at the heart of who we are and what we do.

As the NA Meeting Growth Trend chart on the following page illustrates, much of NA's growth is taking place outside the US. Our collective challenge is that some of the places where NA is experiencing the greatest growth are places that have the fewest resources. One way NAWS supports Fellowship development (FD) is by providing NA literature for free or at a reduced cost. In fact, the cost to NAWS for free and subsidized literature hit a record high in fiscal year (FY) 2019. On the one hand, this is exciting because it indicates a rising demand for NA literature, and that means Fellowship growth. On the other hand,



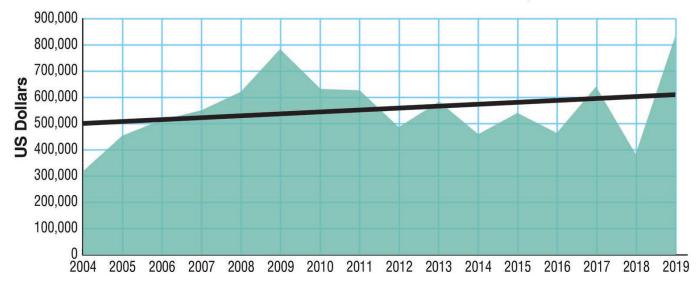
Note: While NAWS maintains an extensive database of registered NA meetings around the world, we know our records are often inaccurate. When a meeting closes, for instance, we are usually not notified and don't know to delete the meeting. The chart above reflects the figures we gather directly from NA communities around the world, with the primary source of information coming from regional reports submitted to the WSC to capture the most accurate data.

our commitment to sustainability requires careful consideration of how NAWS' services are funded, as reflected in the theme for the 2020 World Service Conference: Invest in Our Vision.

While sustainability is key to NAWS' effectiveness, it's just one of the many challenges that require us to remain nimble in our operations and unified in our

approach. NAWS' strategic planning process attempts to strike a balance between the competing goals of sustainability, growth, flexibility, and unity. We gather data, assess challenges, and find solutions that help NA continue to grow in our ever-changing world. It's clear that we're better together, so we regularly explore ways we can make our planning process more collaborative

by involving Conference participants (CP) who represent the concerns of NA groups worldwide. By working together, we can move toward creating a prudent and effective mechanism for addressing the issues our Fellowship faces collectively and continue to expand the availability of the NA message to the addict who still suffers around the world.

The NAWS, Inc. Annual Report provides an opportunity to highlight Fellowship growth and to assess the financial implications of NAWS' support for FD. Within the pages of this publication, you'll find details of the year's financial activities. This is a valuable opportunity to show the Fellowship how NA's guiding principles drive NAWS' operations. We believe that when our members better understand the scope of NAWS' work and how unity shapes our approach in dealing with challenges, we unite with a stronger sense of purpose and responsibility for the program that saved our lives. For this reason, we strive to report in enough detail to offer transparency and make every effort to communicate effectively with a broad audience. It's imperative that our members know that every investment in NAwhether it's a service effort or financial contributionreinforces the advancement of our primary purpose across the globe.

Thank you for your continued support and this extraordinary opportunity to serve Narcotics Anonymous. We hope you are as excited as we are about the Fellowship development that NAWS supports, and we look forward to continuing this magical journey together.

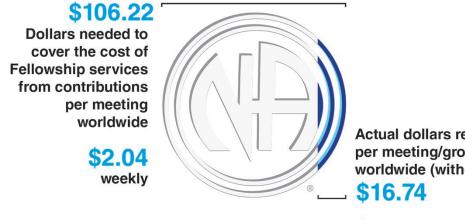
A Look at Self-Support

NA members contribute to our vision in many ways: starting and maintaining meetings, working on local translation committees, and bringing meetings into jails and prisons, to name a few. And the truth is, without members dedicating their time and energy in pursuit of our primary purpose, NA would not be the global lifesaving Fellowship it is today. At the same time, monetary resources play an essential role in delivering many of these vital services. With this in mind, it seems appropriate to regularly assess our financial contributions.

The reality of NAWS' funding is that we continue to rely heavily on literature sales for income, and this has been concerning since the early 1990s. As the Seventh Tradition guides us to be "self-supporting through our own contributions," it becomes even more important to remember that a dollar in the basket doesn't go as far as it did in the '90s. By the same token, increasing member contributions to World Services helps reduce our reliance on literature sales-with steadily rising production costsand defines our commitment to the addict who still suffers through the principle of self-support.

To understand what "self-supporting" looks like, we divided the cost of fully funding Fellowship services by the number of meetings worldwide. We calculated this per-group estimate strictly for conversational purposes. The graphic below compares current contributions received by what would take to fund Fellowship services solely by contributions.

Worldwide Fellowship Support Cost per Meeting per Year

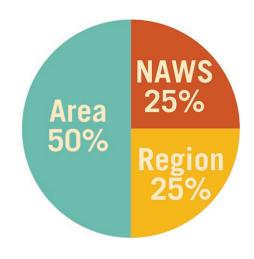

To put it another way, groups that follow a version of the fund flow from IP #28 may find it easier to make the connection between how money put in the basket helps bring the first Swahili Basic Texts to Kenya, for instance. Regardless of the size or type, financial contributions from the Fellowship are part of what helps us remain true to our Traditions and are appreciated, valued, and encouraged.

Projects, Workgroups, and Fellowship Discussions

The NAWS Strategic Plan sets objectives for every two-year Conference cycle. Project plans, including timelines and budgets, come from the strategic plan and require Conference approval. Decisions at WSC 2018 set the agenda for the projects, workgroups, and Fellowship discussions described below.

WSC of the Future

The WSC of the Future Project, approved at the 2018 World Service Conference, was charged with three main goals:

- 1. Build a shared understanding of what is an effective and sustainable WSC.
- 2. Strengthen collaboration among zonal forums and between NAWS and zonal forums.
- 3. Collect and share best practices of zonal forums.

Instead of the Board selecting participants for this project, the 15 zonal forums and Iran chose a participant to serve on the workgroup. This was the first time the Board used this kind of collaborative and collective approach, and it was also the largest and most diverse World Services workgroup ever assembled. To make the best use of time and resources, participants broke into three task teams and held regular virtual meetings between two face-to-face workgroup meetings during the fiscal year.

Some of the results of the project include:

- Virtual Meeting of Zones: An informal way for participants from zones to come together online to share best practices and explore possible ways to collaborate. This meeting will happen three times a year.
- Zonal Report Form: An opportunity for zones to report to the WSC, which will result in a Zonal Snapshots tool providing a picture of each zone.
- Zonal Self-assessment Workshop: Designed to help zones reflect on their development and how to best meet their needs (posted at www.na.org/future).
- GWSNA Update Recommendations: Focused on better describing current practices, including that the WSC is more than a biennial event because its work continues throughout the cycle, and expand-



ing references to communication and collaboration to include web meetings and email communication. These recommendations were included in the suggested *GWSNA* revisions in the 2020 Conference Approval Track (CAT) material.

- Ongoing Discussions: Centered on what an effective and sustainable WSC is and what that means in relationship to the WSC Mission.
- WSC Evaluation Tool: If a sustainable WSC is one that has the resources and ability to achieve its mission, an evaluation tool could clarify the qualities needed by the WSC and measure how effectively the WSC carries out its work. We hope to have some form of evaluation of the 2020 WSC.

Additionally, Motion 15—approved at the 2018 WSC—called for the World Board to develop a project plan "for presentation at WSC 2020 on the role of zones, their relationship to the wider fellowship, including integrating zonal delegate participation into the decision-making process at WSC." Throughout its work, the WSC of the Future Workgroup identified potential input to this project plan and forwarded recommendations to the Board in its final report. The project plan will be included in the 2020 Conference Approval Track material.

SPAD

Work on the Spiritual Principle a Day (SPAD) Book Project got into full swing at the start of fisca year 2019, as we starked to

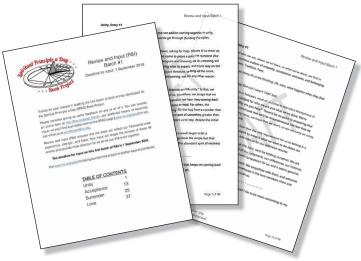


implement the project plan passed at WSC 2018. The plan and subsequent work reflect the priorities and interests of members as expressed in the 2016 CAR literature survey and a follow-up survey focused on shaping the plan. In accordance with the Fellowship's guidance, we have begun to compile a book that reflects members' experience and voice, with true-to-life scenarios that can be a useful recovery tool.

We started this task by creating tools to support a Fellowship-wide writing effort and gathering material that reflects our shared experience. Through this process, we collected over 2,200 pieces of advance material from members within the FY. Thank you for your willingness to participate. With your help, the book is starting to take shape.

The workgroup met face-to-face twice during the 2019 FY with many virtual meetings in between. As you can imagine, it takes a lot of effort to collect, organize, read, and integrate material for this project, but our dedicated workgroup is up to the task. We aim to ensure that the book we're compiling meets the Fellowship's needs and expectations. To that end, during the 2019 FY, the SPAD workgroup has:

- Rolled out 45 spiritual principles with 270 related quotations to date
- Processed writing from members from around the
- Developed entries by weaving together members' writing
- Distributed the first batch of review and input (R&I) drafts



Please visit www.na.org/spad for project updates, workshop materials, and additional batches of R&I drafts. Also, members can submit their writing in any language, electronically or handwritten, so please encourage people in your NA community to host workshops, large or small. There are many approaches to generating submissions, including individual members writing on their own or with their sponsorship family, home group, or service body. Apart from this being a uniquely gratifying experience for our members, continued Fellowship participation also helps to ensure the best book possible.

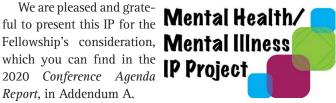
Mental Health/ Mental Illness IP

The Mental Health/Mental Illness IP sprang from two sources: the 2016 CAR survey; and the passage of Motion 3 from the 2016 CAR, which called for the Board to develop a project plan to create an informational pamphlet specifically about mental illness and recovery. We started this process by gathering thoughts from the Fellowship with a survey open to any interested member. Not only did these responses help shape the project plan approved by WSC 2018, but these 794 pieces of input also became the initial source material for the project.

The World Board assembled a workgroup that met face-to-face in September 2018, and for the first time, they formed an additional online focus group for members with fewer than five years clean who were interested in participating. Both groups contributed to the draft posted online for 90-day review and input, and we were thrilled to have received 498 responses from throughout the US and 15 other countries. The workgroup met again in June 2019, to consider the Fellowship's input and to develop the approval draft of the IP.

The IP has topic headings to assist members who have specific concerns. Some ideas about mental health conditions in recovery are reiterated throughout the piece, as we believe it is helpful to illustrate their significance. As an example, we thought that experience with maintaining one's recovery and mental health well-being is important, so it is mentioned a few times. To support the experience in this IP, we have included quotes from members and quotes from the Basic Text, It Works: How and Why, Living Clean, Just for Today, In Times of Illness, and Guiding Principles.

We are pleased and grate-Fellowship's consideration, Mentalliness 2020 Conference Agenda IP Project which you can find in the Report, in Addendum A.



FIPT Operational Rules and **Bulletins Workgroup**

The sole object and purpose of the Trust is to hold and administer all recovery literature and other intellectual properties of the Fellowship of Narcotics Anonymous in a manner that will help addicts find recovery from the disease of addiction and carry that message of recovery to the addict who still suffers, in keeping with the Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions of NA.

FIPT, Article I, Section 4

The Fellowship Intellectual Property Trust (FIPT) is a legal document that addresses the need to protect NA's property so that the Fellowship of NA can continue to own its own materials. The FIPT details how NA's name, trademarks, and recovery literature are protected and administered by Narcotics Anonymous World Services, Inc. so that NA can ensure these materials are available to fulfill our primary purpose.

In 2017, an NA region made a request to inspect the property of the Trust. The inspection, which was the first of its kind, took place in May 2018, and it raised some questions for us about the inspection process as it is described in the Operational Rules of the FIPT. We talked with Conference participants about revisions we believed were necessary to update the section of the Operational Rules that describes how an inspection of the Trust can be performed.

With consensus support, the Conference decided that a change was needed to Operational Rules, Article V, Section 3: Inspection of Trustee Activities. Also, with consensus support, the Conference decided to suspend this inspection clause until the close of WSC 2020 so that a decision could be made about how to handle inspections in the future. The WSC agreed to the creation of the FIPT Operational Rules and Bulletins Workgroup, a virtual workgroup that met throughout the 2018-2020 Conference cycle.

The workgroup offered a series of recommendations that the Board discussed at several meetings. The Board discussed the workgroup's recommendations with Conference participants during the August 2019 CP web meeting and posted the recommendations on www.na.org. After that meeting the Board made some nonsubstantive wording changes suggested by our intellectual property attorney and then discussed the recommendations with participants again during the October 2019 CP web meeting. The result is the three motions related to the FIPT contained in the Conference Agenda Report. Motion #3 proposes changes to the FIPT Operational

Rules; Motion #4 proposes changes to Intellectual Property Bulletin #1, more commonly referred to as the US Policy; and Motion #5 would initiate the process to revise the FIPT itself in the future.

Local Service Toolbox

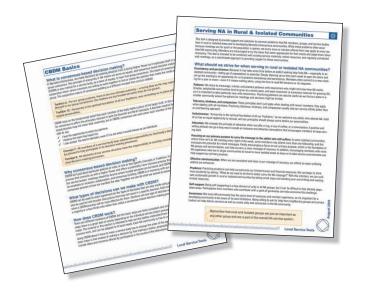
The Local Service Toolbox Project produces service tools that reflect our Fellowship's best practices and experiences in delivering services locally. It was approved at WSC 2016 as



part of the Service Tools project plan and again at WSC 2018 as part of the Training and Tools project plan.

Rather than forming a workgroup for this project, we hold online meetings that are open to any member who wants to be involved. We then use input from these online meetings to create drafts of the service tools. In the previous 2018 fiscal year, we completed the service tool, Consensus-Based Decision Making Basics, a copy of which can be found on the Local Service Toolbox page here: www.na.org/toolbox. In August 2019, shortly after the close of the 2019 FY, we completed the Serving NA in Rural & Isolated Communities service tool, which you can also find on the Local Service Toolbox webpage.

While the Serving NA in Rural & Isolated Communities service tool was in the approval process, we started work on GSR Basics, and we are looking forward to making that tool available for 90-day review and input. We continue to be inspired by the engagement of interested NA



members in this process, and we are excited to continue to produce these local service tools with a diverse group of recovering addicts. We thank all the members who have participated in this project for their dedication and insightful input. Conventions and Events Toolbox

The Conventions and Events Toolbox Project aims to support local conventions and events by developing resources that feature best practices and experiences for service

Ongoing Workgroups

In addition to project plans, the Conference assigns NAWS a variety of ongoing work, including publishing periodicals like *The NA Way* and *Reaching Out*. Each of the following tasks consists of a workgroup with a World Board member, and most of them meet virtually.

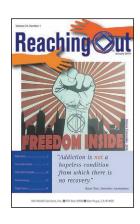
Audit Committee: In compliance with legal requirements for nonprofits, NAWS has an Audit Committee. This workgroup operates on behalf of the Board and independently of NAWS management. Comparing our internal reports to those of the auditor confirms the validity of our accounting and financial reporting. This impartial verification serves as an affirmation of our accounting and financial reporting.

Business Plan Workgroup: This workgroup focuses on the routine business operations of NAWS and makes recommendations to the Board on business matters. Additionally, as required by law, a portion of this group fulfills the audit committee function.

<u>Delegates Sharing:</u> This workgroup focuses on fostering unity, familiarity, and understanding among delegates. The workgroup implements a Conference session for attendees to share their experiences in more personal, small-group discussions and also coordinates

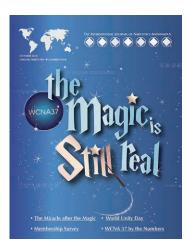
workshops for the Unity Day held the day before the Conference opens. One hope is that the Delegates Sharing session helps everyone move through the Conference week with a greater appreciation for their peers and a sense of camaraderie and unity.

Reaching Out: NAWS' PR department handles the newsletter, Reaching Out, which is designed to help incarcerated addicts connect to the NA program of recovery, enhance H&I efforts, and offer experience from members who successfully transition from the "inside" to be productive members of society. Currently, Reaching Out has over 28,000 subscriptions.



<u>The NA Way Magazine</u>: This journal is dedicated to the celebration of our message of recovery. We aim to provide each member with recovery and service information, as well as recovery-related entertainment, current issues,

and events relevant to each of our members worldwide. All material comes from NA members, and we accept submissions in the same languages in which we publish The NA Way: English, Farsi, French, German, Japanese, Portuguese, Russian, and Spanish. The NA Way is in its 37th year and currently has over 40,000 subscribers.



Issue Discussion Topics

An Issue Discussion Topic (IDT) is a subject that recovering addicts throughout the world focus on in workshops during a two-year Conference cycle. Each new cycle ushers in new IDTs for members to discuss. For the last two Conference cycles, the Conference Agenda Report included a survey that enables members to participate in prioritizing the issues most relevant to them. Ultimately, IDTs encourage us to think more deeply about relevant topics and help build unity within our groups and service bodies.

The World Board encourages attendees to email pictures of notes and other input directly to the Board at worldboard@na.org. This inclusive approach enables more members than ever before to help inform the direction of Fellowship resources and services that result from this process. Below, you'll find a summary of the three topics explored in the 2019 fiscal year. We will include a complete overview of IDT input in the Conference Report, which is published shortly before each WSC. You can find resources to support IDT workshops in a variety of languages at www.na.org/idt.

DRT/MAT

After notifying the 2018 WSC that there would likely be a third IDT added for the 2018-2020 Conference cycle, we decided to add Drug Replacement Therapy/Medication-Assisted Treatment (DRT/MAT) as It Relates to NA during our June 2018 Board meeting. For this topic, we have received input from 20 events in four different countries, including WCNA 37. The issue of addicts attending NA meetings while on DRT/MAT and the ability of groups to make them feel welcome has become increasingly pressing for many NA groups.

Not only was this identified as having a high impact in the 2016-2018 NAWS Strategic Plan, but it was also the subject of a regional motion in the 2018 CAR:

Motion 9: To direct the World Board to create a project plan for consideration at WSC 2020 to create or revise one piece of recovery literature to directly address Drug Replacement Therapy (DRT) and Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT) as it relates to NA.

Intent: To begin the discussion on how to address DRT/MAT in a piece of recovery literature as it relates to our message and program and have a unified fellowship position.

During a web meeting in July 2018, Conference participants helped to frame the discussion aiming to gather input, raise awareness among members, and encourage dialogue within the Fellowship about how NA members and groups respond to and welcome addicts on DRT/MAT.

We hoped the input from this IDT would help shape the project plan called for in Motion 9, and this has been partially successful. We received many ideas about how we can better welcome members and potential members. Most notably, these ideas were consistent regardless of the workshop location. The main ideas shared are:

- Welcome addicts who are attending NA while on DRT/MAT. They are still NA members, and we should treat them like any other member.
- Connect members on DRT/MAT with others who had the same experience and achieved abstinence.
- Consider developing consistent language in the form of a statement that can be included in meeting formats.

What we have not heard is the input that helps us frame a piece of Fellowship-approved literature about this issue. Unless the Conference can provide us with other



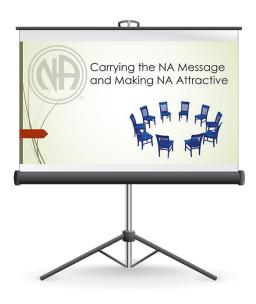
directions, we will propose that we frame an additional discussion about this topic for the 2020-2022 Conference cycle that seeks to gather the needed input.

Attracting Members to Service

This IDT addresses a lack of human resources, a long-standing challenge that many NA communities face. For this topic, we have received input from 19 events in four different countries, including WCNA 37. The discussion session outline for this topic focuses on sharing information and best practices to help find potential ways to increase participation in service. The introduction includes a brief overview of our service system structure, followed by encouraging participants to imagine what NA would look like without service. Unsurprisingly, all the responses address the critical role of service within NA, and how without service, there would be no NA.

As participants have shared about the personal benefits of service, common themes have emerged, including spiritual growth, increased knowledge, and a greater sense of connection. Similarly, when asked about what changes could be made to attract more members to service, particularly underrepresented populations, members again seem to be on the same page. They have offered responses that included ideas about inclusivity, personal behavior, and a focus on our primary purpose.



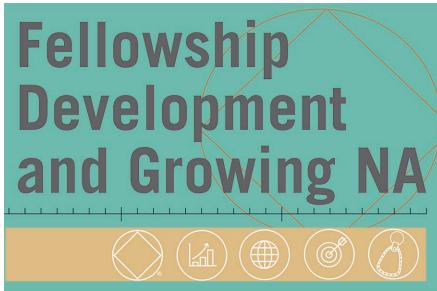


Carrying the Message and **Making NA Attractive**

This topic examines the foundation of NA and our primary purpose-better carrying the message and welcoming any addict who comes to a meeting. For this IDT, we have received input from 19 events in seven different countries, including WCNA 37. The session outline begins with a large group discussion, asking members to reflect on their personal experience of being welcomed into NA, be it positive or negative. Members then share their experiences intending to put themselves in the shoes of the newcomer.

Responses to the questions from the small group discussions have shown that members have a clear understanding of what the NA message is. Also, members have presented a variety of ways to demonstrate a commitment to carrying the message. To that end, much of the input mentions specific actions, including sharing positively, working the Twelfth Step, and actively supporting groups and group support forums. Participants have also discussed the importance of regular group inventories and workshops to help train and mentor newer members.

Members have examined how carrying the message can be a way to increase unity within NA and help create a supportive environment that will encourage newcomers to stay. Comparatively, participants have also seen a commitment to carrying the message as a path to improve society's perception of NA as a viable program of recovery. Ideas for ways to welcome newcomers include having a greeter at the meeting and offering phone numbers to new members so we can meet them "where they're at." The most important idea discussed, however, was remembering to welcome every addict, "regardless of "

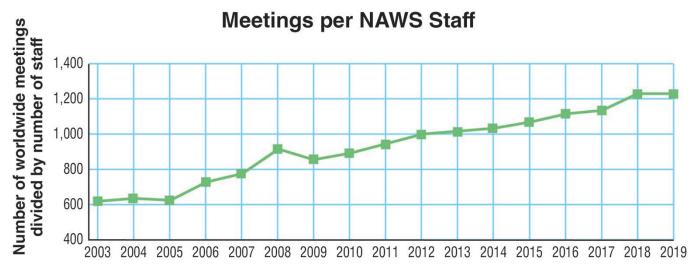
Fellowship Support

The heart of NA World Services beats for one purpose: the still-suffering addict. For this reason, our Fellowship support efforts remain a priority, and it's why we invest our human and financial resources in helping NA groups and members carry our message of recovery. And perhaps, more than anything else, the efforts demonstrate our dedicated pursuit of a day where addicts worldwide can experience the NA message and find a new way to live.

Assisting NA service bodies all over the world is fundamental to NAWS' Fellowship support, which means we respond to many requests to attend service events like zonal forums, service symposiums, and regional learning days, to name a few. We support these events by facilitating sessions related to the World Service Conference, current projects, Issue Discussion Topics, NAWS updates, as well as planning and service workshops. While time and money constraints mean we must decline some requests, the following table catalogs all of the events attended and workshops conducted this fiscal year.

Helping NA take root in developing communities is another foundational aspect of Fellowship support. The most tangible way we nurture NA growth is by providing free and subsidized literature where NA is just starting to bloom. But we also support emerging NA communities with guidance and resources that help strengthen service delivery and meeting growth. This support forms a two-way street of communication and collaboration. In one direction, an emerging NA community develops opportunities to network, share best practices, and serve more effectively. In turn, World Board members and NAWS staff can collaborate with members from various NA communities and foster trust and goodwill. What's more, our travels strengthen connections between the Fellowship and NAWS, and these interactions help inform the NAWS Strategic Plan.

When we work together, we can reach farther to serve the addict who still suffers and carry the message much more effectively. We're highlighting the results of these

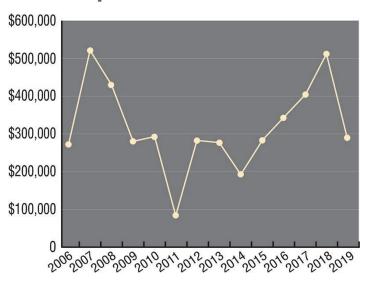

joint efforts by trying something new in this Annual Report-we asked members to share directly about their experience working with NAWS in their corners of the world. It's important to remember that the history of an NA community can be told from many viewpoints, and what is offered here is just that: the perspective of the members sharing their experience. We are grateful to those who participated, and we hope you enjoy these two Fellowship development profiles from Namibia and Paraguay.

NAWS and **NA** in Namibia: A Partnership for Growth

Namibia is situated in southwestern Africa and is roughly 825,000 square kilometers (about 319,000 square miles) with a population of approximately 2.5 million people. The country has one of the lowest population densities on the planet, which creates vast distances between our cities and towns.

NA in Namibia is still in its infancy. There was one meeting in the capital city of Windhoek beginning in the mid-2000s, and later another meeting was established in Swakopmund, a coastal city 400 kilometers from Windhoek. Meeting attendance has always fluctuated and, for the most part, a handful of members have kept meeting doors open. The Windhoek meeting operated mostly out of a briefcase until late 2016, when the current venue was established and there was space and security to leave meeting material at the venue—and a sense of a home was able to take root. Also, there was a time when the meeting in Swakopmund didn't officially identify as an NA meeting. Because of NA's limited presence, the recovery scene there consisted of members from Alcoholics Anonymous meeting with NA members.

In the last few years, our NA community has grown, and Namibia has become a participant of the Afri-can Zonal Forum (AZF), which is comprised of 14 NA regions (1 seated at the WSC/13 unseated). The AZF helped members connect with other members on the continent and within the South Africa Region, building networks and awareness of NA meetings in different countries. In fact, a Namibian NA member who was in a rehabilitation clinic in South Africa asked Tanzanian NA members who were making a Twelfth-Step visit at the clinic about starting NA meetings in Namibia, only to be told there was already a meeting in Windhoek. This encounter helped the Namibian member find the meeting in their own home country. Another result of networking was that the South Africa Region provided NA Namibia with printed posters, which were distributed to raise NA awareness.

At the 2017 AZF meeting in Durban, South Africa, we talked with a World Board member and World Services staff about NA Namibia. Upon request, NAWS sent NA Windhoek a massive donation of literature, Group Starter Kits (GSK), and keytags to help stabilize and grow NA in Windhoek. NAWS donated this literature for us to determine the best way to distribute it to help grow NA. NA in Windhoek started supplying the Swakopmund group with literature, and attempts were made to establish meetings in the towns of Otjiwarongo and Usakos with mixed results. The Otjiwarongo meeting is still alive with two members meeting whenever possible, but the Usakos community has not yet utilized the recovering addicts at a "dry-out" clinic nearby to anchor a meeting. The big success, however, is that the Swakopmund group established a meeting 30 kilometers (about 19 miles) away in Walvis Bay in 2019, and members drive the round-trip weekly to keep the doors open.

The literature donation from NAWS was the catalyst for developing NA in Namibia. NA Windhoek was selling the literature to members there and in Swakopmund, slowly raising funds for activities and services. Literature sales also strengthened the Swakopmund and Windhoek groups and enabled them to build a relationship after a lengthy period of little to no interaction and cooperation. NA in Namibia started to become more organized.

At the 2018 AZF in Dar-es-Salaam, Tanzania, NA members built on what had been done by Namibian members. They interacted with NAWS and attended workshops that helped tremendously in understanding what NA service was all about and how to use NAWS as a resource. The experience of other members establishing NA in their own countries gave all of us a sense of solidarity with recovering addicts across the continent. NA South Africa became the benchmark for what is possible on the continent, and NA Tanzania became the inspiration for growing NA over a sustained and consistent period.



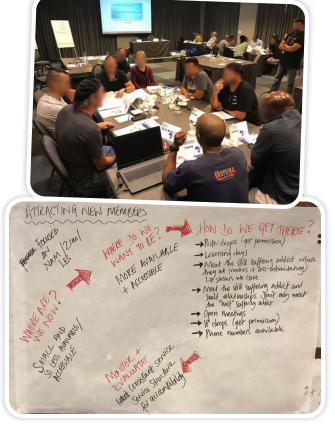

In 2019, NA Windhoek held a unity day called the NA Windhoek Rally. The event coincided with AZF 2019 in South Africa so that members of the World Board and NAWS staff could experience NA in Namibia en route to the AZF meeting. Their presence accelerated the progress of NA in Namibia through discussions about issues that needed to be addressed to continue local NA growth. We were also fortunate to have a member from NA Tanzania attend and share their experience, strength, and hope about development in their community. The unity day was essentially about service and building home groups, which empowered the Swakopmund NA community to take the massive step of formally designating their meeting as a NA meeting to differentiate itself from AA.

NAWS also helped Namibian members focus on their immediate needs and facilitated a workshop about establishing a service structure. Understanding NA's Twelve Concepts for Service and focusing on the basic issues of Fellowship development was critical to our growth. The importance of Namibian NA members interacting with members from elsewhere in the world cannot be overstated. Not only did the experience, strength, and hope shared help individual members on a personal level; it also helped the Namibian NA community grow by shedding light on the group's role in building the service structure. One member was so inspired that she decided to commit herself completely to the NA program after speaking to a NAWS member. Another member got a sponsor, and all members gained insight on service, dealing with personality clashes, and how to resolve conflicts-some of the challenges of developing our NA communities.

NAWS continues to support us with literature, which helps us to raise funds needed for NA Namibia to grow. What NAWS has done for NA Namibia is immense. Their dedication to growing NA on the African continent is laudable, and the results of their support to African countries is inspiring. For Namibia, having direct access to NAWS' support was a watershed moment, and we hope it won't

be the last time that NAWS will visit us. Face-to-face time with members from established NA communities and with World Services is imperative for NA to grow in Namibia, as personal interactions with NA members here have helped our community work together in ways that were not previously possible. Individual members are becoming stronger, who in turn strengthen groups, and this will result in a stronger nationwide service structure. The importance of service can be read about and can be listened to on web platforms, but the personal connection and interaction with members who have so much experience to share is what will be crucial to NA growing in Africa.



Paraguay

Greetings from the Paraguay NA community, and thank you for the opportunity to share about our development.

In 2001, NA in Paraguay took its first steps with the assistance of a non-member who helped the first members to open an NA group. On 15 February 2001, the first NA group in Paraguay was founded in the city of Asuncion: Grupo El Despertador (The Alarm Clock Group) was started, and it continued meeting for several years.

Additionally, two other groups had meetings in members' homes, one of which was owned by the clergy. Sadly, Grupo El Despertador eventually had to close. Back then, we did not have any idea about a service structure. The most important thing for us was to have a place for addicts to meet and to share some literature obtained by addicts who had traveled to Argentina.

One day, one of our first members, who is still clean today, got a surprise: a phone call from NA World Services! After that call, the communication in our NA community increased. NA members from Argentina and Uruguay even came to share their personal and service experience. They guided us on how groups function, the need to meet in places accessible to all instead of in members' homes, meeting formats, the spirit of the Seventh Tradition, and so on. From that point on, we began to have an understanding of what NA represented and how it functioned globally.

NAWS funded members from nearby NA regions to travel to Paraguay; with their help, we held the first H&I meeting in the Tacumbú prison and in a mental health institution, which is now an addiction treatment center. The Libertad ASC continues to serve both of these institutions.

After we established contact with these members from neighboring regions, we received literature from NAWS, which gave us more literature resources for present and incoming members. One of the groups that met in a member's home eventually moved to a church and started paying rent, and this is the oldest group in the region Grupo Serenidad (Serenity Group). Then some members of that group decided to open another group, Grupo El Ultimo Vagón (The Last Wagon Group), which still holds six weekly meetings. This group is the first one that fully followed "the NA way" of doing things.

We continued to grow, and in 2005, we became a region of the Latin American Zonal Forum (LAZF). And our first regional delegate attended and participated in the zonal forum meeting. After that, we have had more contact with the NA Fellowship through workshops held by the LAZF, the Brazilian Zonal Forum, the Río Grande do Sul and Grande Sao Paulo Regions (Brazil), the Southern Multiregional meeting (which includes Argentina, Chile, Paraguay, Uruguay, and Bolivia), and NAWS-all who helped us grow as a region.

In 2014, something that seemed difficult to accomplish became a reality: we held our first regional convention, which was attended by a member of the World Board and a NAWS staff member. The convention was another sign of our development, and in 2018, we held our second regional convention, which again was attended by a member from the WB and a NAWS staff member. In addition, we created two events, a nature gathering, which will be held for the third time in 2020, and the Weaving Recovery, which was held for the third time in 2019.

As we continued to develop, with help from NAWS, we created a Fellowship development workgroup. Through this workgroup, we opened three groups outside of Asunción,





the capital city. These groups received their group starter kits and literature thanks to a NAWS donation. After the election of our regional trusted servants, the workgroup became a regional subcommittee, which provides services to faraway groups, area service committees, and isolated members to help them open groups in their communities.

Our second convention was the driving force to create our first Metropolitan ASC, followed by the East ASC and the Libertad ASC, and eventually developing the service structure of the Paraguay NA region, which today has 21 groups. In September 2020, we will have our third regional convention, thanks to the efforts of our regional events subcommittee.

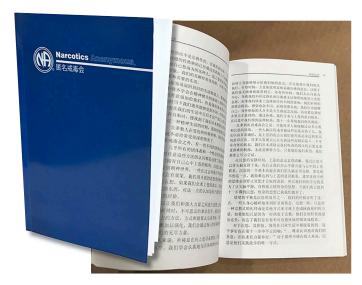
Growth is a reality in our region, and we achieved it with the help of our Higher Power, the first service efforts of our members, and committed trusted servants from the groups and the region. But we can't forget about participation from trusted servants from neighboring regions and NA World Services, all who have demonstrated their dedication to helping us and to share their valuable resources so we can fulfill our primary purpose.

This has taken time, a lot of effort and preparation, workshops, and difficult times that helped us grow. There have also been unforgettable moments that continue to motivate us to work in unity for our present and future members. Thank you, NA, for giving us a purpose: to carry the message to the addict who still suffers!

Translations

Longtime Translations Team Manager, Uschi Mueller, retired in January 2019. Uschi spearheaded the team's processes and helped create a system that endures to this day. A debt of gratitude will always be associated with Uschi's contribution to furthering our message far and wide. Another longtime Translations Team member, Shane Colter, was promoted to continue leading the team toward the NAWS Vision for NA Service.

Nary a dull moment befalls the Translations Team! Books, booklets, IPs, SPs, keytags, and more keep coming from NA communities across the planet to become published NA literature. Typically, a draft created by a Local Translation Committee, or LTC, will arrive via email (still our preferred mode of communication). Thus begins that draft's journey through a stringent process that assures both conceptual fidelity and keeping with that language's publication standards. Conceptual fidelity is a term that Translation Basics describes as making "sure that NA literature carries the same message, regardless of the publication's language." It also works to encourage the translation of ideas, not word-for-word, which has sullied some communities' work over the years. Through the use of a professional proofreader for that language, word-for-word



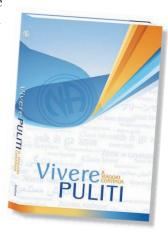
translations get worked out with the LTC in favor of the translation of ideas that capture the same meaning as the English original. The proofreader also assists us in assuring the publication standards for that language are correct—concerns such as spelling, grammar, and punctuation rules that often are not the same as English.

Once we have a clean draft that the LTC has approved, it moves to the typeset list. The Production Team is responsible for this step, and once the item is typeset, it is returned to the Translations Team for review by the proofreader once again—a process we refer to as QC, or quality check. Occasionally, in the conversion of the draft document to the typesetting software we use, mishaps may occur, wherein the formatting may be skewed, such as the loss of italics or bold or certain accent marks do not come through. Once the QC process is complete and all issues resolved (if any), the final draft joins the production queue, nearing the end of its journey to publication.

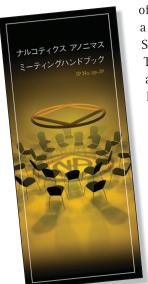
As in years past, this year brought to fruition many projects that make a difference in our members' lives—those who are already here and those yet to arrive. One project that stands to impact the most members (current and future) is the Chinese Basic Text. To get this book published required herculean efforts from the LTC, the proofreader, and NAWS over a period of time. While Fellowship growth has been

incremental in comparison to the Chinese population, the potential for explosive growth cannot be discounted. This book was ready in time for a professional event that NAWS attended in the Chinese capital of Beijing in May 2019.

The ever-popular *Living Clean* made its debut to the Fellowship in Italy in March 2019 and was met with great fanfare across the Italian peninsula. This publication continues to inspire



members across the world as it is translated into more and more languages. Along with this news is the publication



of the Basic Text in Bahasa Melayu, a language spoken in Malaysia and Singapore, and the Latvian Basic Text. Also quite busy was the Japanese LTC! While several of their IPs were published over the year, IP #29 was snagged up due to a formatting issue. Japanese publications have a specific layout, and the LTC performs the typesetting of their drafts after proofreading and sends NAWS the final typeset version. Uncharacteristically, IP #29 arrived with problems, and NAWS worked with the LTC to finalize the draft for publication.

With over seven million speakers spread across the Middle East, a standardized form of Kurdish known as Sorani-Kurdish is spoken in NA meetings in Iran and Iraq, which is written with Arabic characters. The Kurdish LTC in Iran translated IP #1 and sent it to NAWS. With coordination among NAWS, the LTC, and a professional proofreader, a glossary was created from the draft. As is frequently the case, significant back-and-forth occurs in the effort to get the NA message just right in the translation when working with a new community that desires literature in its own language. Keep an eye out for Kurdish IP #1 in the near future!

Over and over, we hear about communities struggling with a lack of trusted servants to fill available positions. H&I and PR committees around the world are in dire need of members to serve. Imagine if you lived in a community that had the added need for trusted servants to fill the Local Translation Committee. Most English speakers may not have reason to consider this factor, but communities that wish to have the message in their own language sure do! It is with this realization that the NAWS Translation Team applauds those communities that are able to find members to do LTC service, along with doing their level best to carry the message to hospitals, institutions, and the public. All of you may make the difference between life and death for those still suffering from the horrors of addiction, and we are so grateful for your efforts.

Production and Distribution

Making sure addicts seeking recovery have access to NA literature is one of NAWS' highest priorities, and it's also why our publishing responsibilities go far beyond supplying NA recovery literature. The distribution of NA literature is vital to Fellowship development, so our production practices must allow for our commitment to providing translated materials and free and subsidized literature to those who need it. With this in mind, we tirelessly pursue the most cost-effective and efficient production and distribution methods available.

In this fiscal year, we committed an unprecedented amount of staff time, financial resources, use of outside contractors, and other means to improve our production processes. One major change we made was leasing a new machine to produce almost all non-English materials and having this managed and run by professional publishers, which improves the quality of materials, especially softcover books. Another shift we made was increasing our use of outside contractors for typesetting and proofing to reduce preparation time for publication. While we are pleased with the results of these changes so far, we know there is still more work to do!

Our dedication to getting literature to members who need it for free or at a reduced cost means working with every request we receive from members, groups, and NA communities worldwide. We fulfill thousands of yearly requests for literature from inmates, as well as members asking for a Basic Text who cannot afford one. We also help groups that need books for reference or IPs at their meetings, and we supply hundreds of group starter kits each year to new groups that ask for help. This doesn't include the massive supply it takes to support developing communities worldwide, including entire regions, with much-needed literature assistance.

Free and subsidized literature is only one aspect of our ongoing responsibilities to serve the Fellowship's literature needs. We must also use our limited resources strategically to reduce costs while continuing to provide a high level of service to our members. For instance, in-house production allows us to be more flexible for language groups with smaller orders by printing only what we need, and this reduces our dependence on vendors that require large orders for discounts. We also started producing some of our translated literature closer to large NA communities outside North America to control customs, duties, and shipping costs. Specifically, we have reduced costs and shipping time by producing and distributing NA literature locally in Argentina, Brazil, Egypt, and Russia.

Our commitment to using Fellowship resources responsibly means continually looking for the "sweet spot" where we can reduce costs while still meeting the increasing demand for NA literature year after year. While fluctuations in production and demand mean effective cost-reduction is often a moving target, we remain vigilant because your contributions fuel this necessary aspect of NAWS.

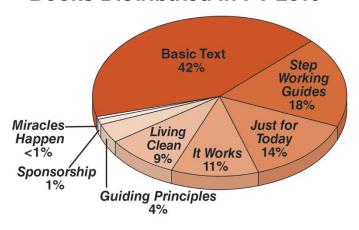
Highlights of the 2019 Fiscal Year

- We produced over 71,000 books, more than 100,000 booklets, almost 25,000 handbooks and reports, and more than 800,000 IPs and small booklets in-house.
- We fulfilled more than 74 orders per day, averaging about 1,490 per month.
- We published 49 new pieces of translated literature, bringing our inventory to 1,142 titles.
- With each piece of literature, and with each order throughout each year, our goal is to help fulfill our Vision for NA Service and NA's primary purpose: *NA meets in 82 languages and IP #1 is published in 56 languages.*

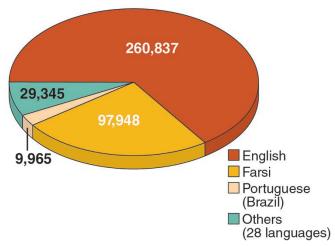
Books

The Basic Text continues to be the NA book in the highest demand, making up 42 percent of the books distributed, and 53 percent of our book revenue, in FY 2019. We have distributed over 11.6 million copies of Narcotics Anonymous (aka the Basic Text) since its publication in 1983. Combining this book with other book-length NA literature, Narcotics Anonymous has distributed almost 22 million books to date.

Books Distributed in FY 2019



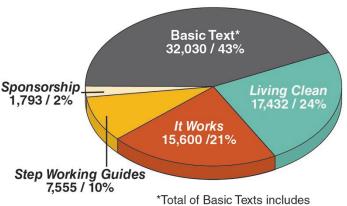
FY 2019 Basic Text Distributed by Language



Electronic Literature (e-lit)

E-lit represents a relatively small proportion of the books we distribute. Monthly distributions through a variety of commercial portals total only a few hundred e-books each month. As with print literature, our most popular titles—Basic Text, *Living Clean*, and the *NA Step Working Guides*—top e-lit sales.

*Total of Basic Texts includes 194 (.6%) non-English downloads

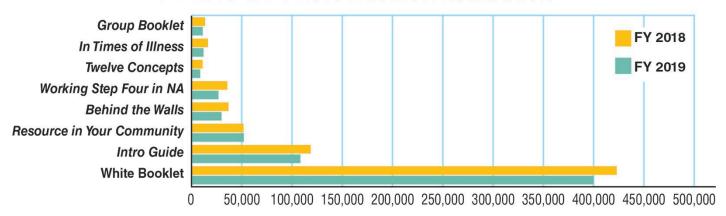

Booklet distribution in FY 2019 saw an 8 percent decline compared to FY 2018 and 17 percent decrease compared to FY 2017.

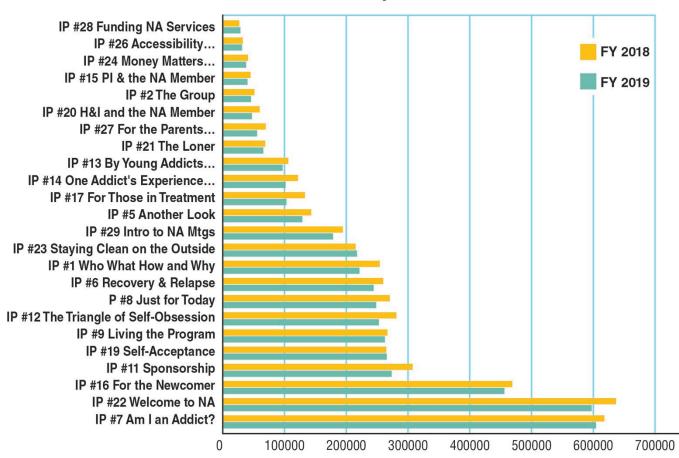
FY 2018 & FY 2019 Booklet Distribution

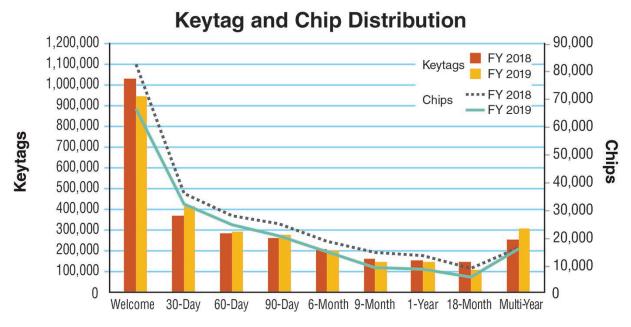
Distribution for all 24 IPs decreased by 7 percent from the previous fiscal year. *Am I an Addict?* (IP #7), *Welcome to NA* (IP #22), and *For the Newcomer* (IP #16) continue to top distribution numbers with an average of a 4 percent decrease this year.

Keytags, Chips, and Medallions

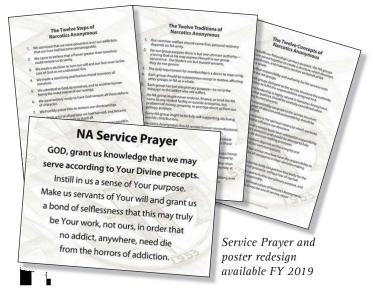
Distribution of keytags and chips decreased by 1 percent and 20 percent, respectively. Medallion distribution decreased by 5 percent.



Who Buys NA Literature?

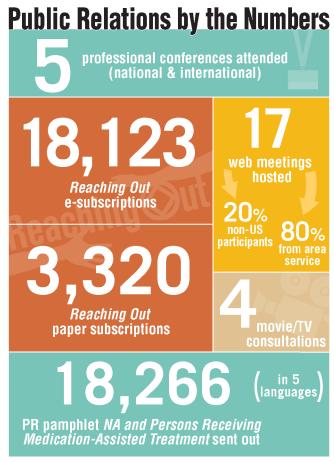
As you already may know, NAWS has discount schedules for orders over \$500 and for contract customers. The terms and rates of this discount policy apply to Fellowship and non-Fellowship entities alike and are spelled out on our website at https://cart-us.na.org/ discount policy. Many regional service offices order large quantities, so they enter into contracts with us to benefit from our discounts. These regional service office contracts make up nearly 40 percent of NAWS literature sales, followed by sales to groups, and then sales to areas. Taken together, our literature customers within the Fellowship make up approximately 80 percent of our overall literature sales.

Non-NA entities, such as correctional facilities, treatment centers, hospitals, resellers, government offices, and drug courts, account for the remaining 20 percent of our literature sales. From time to time, a narrative emerges claiming that NAWS is beholden to a particular reseller of books on addiction and recovery and that we offer special discounts or even develop literature with this reseller in mind. Let us be clear, there is no truth to these rumors. Not only would that idea conflict with our guiding principles, but the financial reality contradicts that story, as resellers traditionally make up less than 7 percent of our total sales. The fact is, our members buy the vast majority of our literature, which isn't surprising. After all, our literature is written by addicts for addicts.



Public Relations in Fiscal Year 2019

Nearly half of our members are referred to NA by a treatment facility or counseling agency, which is why PR committees all over the world work to increase professional and public awareness of NA. These efforts include conducting PR presentations, staffing booths at professional events, and arranging for posters, billboards, and public service announcements. When the public sees NA as a viable and credible means of recovery, more addicts find their way to our meetings, and this makes PR efforts at every level of the NA service system integral to our primary purpose.



In the US, the practices of medication-assisted treatment (MAT) and drug-replacement therapy (DRT) continue to rise in treatment centers, corrections facilities, and drug courts. For this reason, making sure professionals and organizations that regularly deal with addicts know that their clients are welcome in NA is more crucial than ever. We may also want to be mindful of taking time to welcome these potential members to our meetings; otherwise, we could lose an entire generation of membership. Guided by Tradition Three, we seek to welcome all addicts to our meetings and to help them gain a sense of hope and belonging.

NAWS supports the PR work of NA areas, regions, and zones by providing relevant tools, literature upon request, and networking opportunities. One aspect of this support includes hosting regular PR web meetings to help members gather to share best practices and experiences with PR, H&I, Phonelines, and inmate step writing. These member-driven meetings cultivate engaging discussions with diverse input from members all over the world. In the 2019 FY, we hosted 12 such web meetings, which has allowed us to continue to build robust and supportive networks brimming with passion and expertise.

NAWS also hosts web meetings for zones to improve collaboration among service bodies and assist with zonal public relations work. Since these web meetings began, we have seen a notable increase in PR and H&I services delivered by zones, and we are excited to continue to facilitate collaboration and growth in this area.

Conferences

NAWS PR extends beyond Fellowship support as we continue to establish and develop relationships with professionals who work with addicts. These efforts include government and media relations, zonal planning, and attending national or international conferences. Attending conferences gives us a particular advantage to build NA's reputation by interacting with thousands of professionals and informing them about NA over the course of a few days. These opportunities help us demonstrate NA's viability and give professionals more confidence in sending their clients to our meetings.

2019 FY PR Highlight

PR Week

PR Week is an annual event during the first week of June for the Fellowship to hold events simultaneously and work together to further PR and PI efforts worldwide. The inaugural PR week was 3–9 June 2019, and the feedback from the Fellowship inspiring. We received pictures and details of events from regions across ten NA zones and Iran. These PR Week events included poster campaigns, learning days with professionals, bus and bus stop posters campaign, and national public service announcements. We are delighted that so many members embraced PR

Basic Services

Aside from our work related to the biennial World Service Conference, much of the work at NAWS is foundational and ongoing. Each team at NAWS provides essential services to meet the communication, coordination, information, and guidance needs of the Fellowship. We respond to more requests and inquiries than ever before, and we get literature to those who need it with greater efficiency, all while remaining prudent in the use of our limited resources.

Today, we have a center of operations in the US, branch offices in Belgium and Iran, and distribution centers in India and Canada. Our ability to meet the increasing demands of our growing Fellowship together with the indispensable work of regions and zones signals our progress toward our shared vision for NA. You'll find specifics about these "basic services" in the 2019 FY in the following sections.

Fellowship Services

The Fellowship Services Team responds to hundreds of requests and inquiries each week from NA members seeking information or support. This correspondence includes inmates requesting literature, trusted servants seeking guidance on Traditions and Concepts, and members trying to solve problems at the local level, to name a few.

We provide resources, information, and share anecdotes and observations that have worked elsewhere—our collective experience, strength, and hope. Often, we can connect members to the wealth of resources available at www.na.org, linking to specific handbooks, service pamphlets, bulletins, and recovery literature. Our support also includes fulfilling requests for meeting starter kits and literature from members—many of them behind bars.

Another aspect of Fellowship Services is working with individuals outside of NA looking for information on addiction. We regularly respond to family members of addicts, government officials, clergy members, and health-care professionals who want to start meetings. We put them in touch with local trusted servants for follow-up, opening the doors for public relations opportunities and potential meeting facilities. We thank all local trusted servants for their partnership in dealing with these requests for meetings and H&I. Your service is an integral part of carrying the NA message to the addicts who still suffer.

The data show how we direct resources—human and financial—to respond to the Fellowship's needs and how that's changed over the past few years.

Communications

The Communications Team is the primary conduit of information between the World Board and the NA Fellowship. We use every avenue available to hear from the Fellowship—calls, emails, surveys, workshops, web meetings, Issue Discussion Topics, regional reports, and more. We compile and relay all member input we receive so the Board can make decisions based on the Fellowship's needs and ideas.

In turn, the Communications Team listens to the Board and, with their direction, facilitates webinars and drafts a variety of reports and correspondence to help keep the Fellowship informed. Some of these communications include NAWS periodicals, emails, memos, session materials for workshops, and World Service Conference materials, including reports, session materials, and summaries—most of which you can find at www.na.org.

As we continue to shift our primary distribution methods from paper to electronic, we encourage all members to subscribe to our periodicals at www.na.org/subscribe. If you subscribe electronically to at least one of three quarterly publications or to the daily Just for Today email, you'll also get periodic emails with World Convention updates, and notifications when various reports and project materials are available.

As a part of NA World Services, "we provide these services so that our groups and members can more successfully carry the message of recovery and so that our program of recovery can be made more available to addicts everywhere." (A Guide to World Services in NA)



NAWS Technology

Technology is not only integral to NAWS' day-to-day operations, but it continues to improve our ability to support members as they carry the NA message of hope. Our ongoing services, such as communication, publication, sales, accounting, and translations all depend on technology. In the same fashion, technology improves our Fellowship development efforts by helping us deliver resources and support more consistently and rapidly, as well as enhancing the effectiveness of the World Service Conference and World Convention of NA.

To stay current with technology, we must regularly filter decisions through the reality of our limited resources. We practice extraordinary discernment when we evaluate which technology investments offer the biggest "bang for the buck" while helping provide essential services to the Fellowship. To guide our decisions, we rely on a comprehensive IT assessment conducted in 2013, which helped us prioritize long-term IT goals in the areas of software, connectivity, infrastructure, and security. In the 2018 FY, we implemented new accounting software with a more robust platform to help us handle the growing needs of our Fellowship, as well as improve our online store. In the 2019 FY, we continue to get accustomed to this new accounting software and look forward to conveying the benefits of this improvement. Focusing on upgrading our software helps us increase digital offerings of literature and resources, and enhances how members, trusted servants, and the public experience NAWS online, regardless of device or platform. Also, embracing software like Zoom helps us meet virtually with workgroups and Conference participants efficiently and effectively, while reducing travel costs.

Achieving sustainability has been the focus of NAWS IT this fiscal year. In this pursuit, we've worked toward ensuring we have a robust infrastructure, sound security, and well-tested disaster recovery methods. Our IT infrastructure is a system of hardware, software, networks, and databases, all of which need constant maintenance and regular upgrades. To build a reliable infrastructure while conserving resources, we work to extend the life of our equipment, and this requires much of our effort year in and year out.

Along with maintaining our infrastructure, we continue to implement security measures to keep our network safe and reliable. We regularly assess risks and deploy multiple layers of protection to assure members' privacy, keep information safe, and secure our network. We also perform nightly backups of our entire system to both local and cloud servers to ensure that we can recover all data and rebound quickly in the event of a disaster. In a word, technology has become an indispensable component of our work at NAWS, and we do everything we can to preserve the integrity of our systems and data.

Staff and Offices

Two distribution centers—one in Mississauga, Ontario, Canada, and the other in Bangalore, India-play a vital role in furthering our vision. Jacquie Sullivan and Paul Sullivan staff the Mississauga center, serving the literature needs of Canadian NA communities, while Pramila Dias distributes literature in 12 languages throughout South Asia from the Bangalore center.



NAWS has two branch offices—One in Brussels, Belgium, and the other in Tehran, Iran. Paul Decock and Fred Renaux maintain our European branch, where they distribute literature in 35 different languages. They print some of the literature onsite and provide some literature at no cost to emerging NA communities in Eastern Europe and Africa. They also serve members, groups, and institutions seeking information about NA, process contributions to NAWS, and support the continent's zonal forum, the European Delegates Meeting.



Siamak Khajeian manages the Iranian branch of the World Service Office, which supports NA's fastest-growing community and its 21,974 meetings. He and his staff at the Tehran service center, Amir Bondar, Farhad Fallah, Mehrdad Naseri, Hossein Nematzadeh, Farhad Poursohei, Reza Tavakoli, and Payam Yazdani, produce and distribute NA literature in Farsi. They also translate The NA Way Magazine each quarter and support many of the essential services offered by the region.



Narcotics Anonymous World Services in Chatsworth, California, is the central resource hub for NA members, groups, and service bodies worldwide. The executive and administrative staff work with the World Board to carry out Conference-approved projects, coordinate workgroups, and execute the World Convention. They communicate with members through a variety of periodicals, reports, web meetings, and emails, and respond to inquiries from the public. The California office is also responsible for the production and distribution of NA literature, protection of the Fellowship's copyrights and trademarks, and maintenance of our website, www.na.org.

WCNA 37

While our financial reconciliation for WCNA 37 was still underway by the time we published the 2018 *Annual Report*, we were able to share that we far exceeded our financial expectations for the event. WCNA 37's favorable financial outcome was the result of a combination of factors, including a record-breaking number of registrations and newcomer donations, more than \$300,000 in negotiated rebates, and trimming many expenses by using fewer contractors while doing much more of the work in-house.

Additionally, the Orange County Convention Center remembered us from the last World Convention in Orlando, and they were motivated to have us back, which lead to deep discounts from them and other vendors. All of these factors created unusual and very hard-to-repeat circumstances for this convention. Perhaps the most significant financial impact of WCNA 37's success is how this revenue can help offset lower turnout for World Conventions held outside of North America. More specifically, WCNA 37's success helps make a location like Australia more possible for WCNA 38.

For those of you who were able to join us at WCNA 37, we thank you for your participation in this celebration of recovery. Your attendance and generous newcomer registration contributions made WCNA 37 the most impressive display of our unity and diversity to date, with over 21,000 registrations. Also, much of the success of WCNA 37 wouldn't have been possible without an incredible local workgroup and the support of the local convention bureau and convention staff, so we send our heartfelt gratitude to them all.

While we included many highlights of WCNA 37 in the 2018 NAWS, Inc. Annual Report, we want to share one more remarkable story here. Not only did local councilman presented WCNA 37 with a proclamation from the city of Orlando at the beginning of the convention, but a state senator who was present because of the PR efforts by local members said that we did not have to tell him about NA. He had spent an hour making his way



through the convention center and had never experienced that level of love in any gathering before. Our members, through their actions, demonstrated that *The Magic is* Still *Real*, and we thank you all for your help in making that possible.

The table on the next page reports the accounting of the WCNA 37 budget compared to actual expenses. And with the books on WCNA 37 closed, we look ahead and prepare for WCNA 38.

WCNA 38

The World Convention Zone Rotation Plan from *A Guide to World Services in Narcotics Anonymous* calls for the location of WCNA 38 to be somewhere in the Asia-Pacific-Middle East-Africa Zone. Accordingly, we hope you are just as excited as we are to have our four-day celebration of recovery in Melbourne, Australia, in 2021—and plans are already starting to take shape!

Our ability to plan the convention using real numbers helps us remain financially prudent, which is why much

of the success this event relies heavily on early registration. As a result, the registration portal will open well in advance of the convention to provide members with ample time to register. But personal planning is equally important. Because of stringent entry requirements, Australia may not grant visas to all of our members. We suggest that you begin your visa application process once WCNA 38 preregistration goes on sale in September 2020. Typically, visas are good for one year.

We will provide updates to all interested members as frequently as we can. If you don't want to miss out, we encourage you to go to www.na.org/wcna and sign up to receive WCNA 38 updates. We hope to see as many of you as possible in Melbourne, Australia, in 2021 to celebrate recovery the NA way! Obviously, current events could impact the upcoming world convention. We will notify the fellowship once we have more information.

Basic Financial Statements: An Overview



This section is our primary delivery method of financial information to interested members and outside parties, as required by law to maintain our nonprofit status.

The following financial statements document NAWS' financial position at the end of FY 2018:

- 1. Fellowship Contributions Report
- 2. Consolidated Statement of Financial Position (Balance Sheet)
- 3. Consolidated Statement of Activities (Income Statement)
- 4. Independent Auditors' Report

For those unaccustomed to analyzing spreadsheets, we've included descriptions of each report and highlighted important information with charts.

Contributions from Members, Groups, and Service Bodies

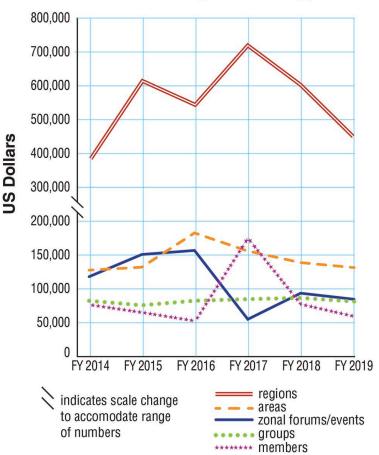
As most of our members understand, the fact that NA World Services must operate as a business does not change the spiritual nature of our goals as an organization. The goals outlined in A Vision for NA Service, approved at WSC 2010, continue to guide everything we do. The enduring pursuit of this vision inspires us to provide the highest level of services we can, as documented in the remainder of this *Annual Report*.

While this FY saw Fellowship contributions decrease by 1% percent, we are deeply inspired by your contribution efforts, and we are grateful for your shared commitment to Tradition Seven and A Vision for NA Service. Thank you!

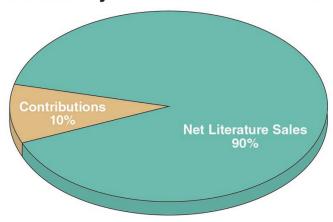
In the graph to the right, you'll find Fellowship contributions for FY 2019 in five different categories—individuals, groups, areas, regions, and zonal forums/ events—over the last six years. Altogether, Fellowship contributions currently make up 10% percent of total NAWS operating income, which can be seen in the chart on the next page.

The detailed list that follows, organized by region, will allow you to analyze contributions in your corner of the globe. We color coded the different types

of contributors in this report to allow the reader to notice trends at a glance. As you'll see, our practices vary from region to region.

Consolidated Statements

The Consolidated Statement of Financial Position (SoFP) and Consolidated Statement of Activities (SoA) summarize the financial activity of NA World Services during the 2019 fiscal year. The SoFP, also known as a balance sheet, gives a simple breakdown of the current NAWS financial assets and liabilities. The SoA, commonly known as an income statement, provides an analysis of the total income and expenses for all branches of NAWS compared to the budget adopted at WSC 2018.

Under each set of expenses, we include allocated costs for accounting, personnel, overhead, and technology. We calculate a fixed percentage each cycle to divide these costs among four areas of activity: literature production and distribution, World Service Conference support, Fellowship development, and events. We base the percentages on three factors: the number of personnel required, estimated labor hours, and the amount of physical office space. Other indirect costs, such as electricity, water, insurance, and taxes, are also estimated for the two-year budget cycle and included as part of these fixed or operational costs.

For fiscal year 2019, we continued to see a decline in literature sales and contributions. With decreasing sales and increasing demand, we were already challenged to meet our mission before the pandemic changed our operations and income, as we have already said in the 2020 Conference Approval Track material.

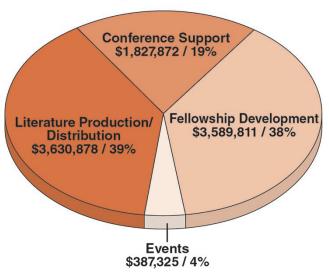
For fiscal year 2019, you will see excess expense over revenue, before WCNA 37, of \$1,399,269. With the

income from the World Convention in Orlando factored in, the final figures for the year change to expense over income of \$300,025. The budget approved at WSC 2018 expected net income over expense.

So what changed? Why are the final figures so different from the figures forecast in the budget? Most of the discrepancy is the result of three factors. Recovery literature income was 5%, or \$433,727, less than budgeted; contributions were 27%, or \$298,480, less than budgeted; and the total of free and subsidized literature was a record high at \$832,316, which was 68%, or \$266,636, more than budget. The total of these three areas over what was budgeted was \$998,843, which was 71% of the excess expense over revenue for 2019, excluding Orlando. (We say "excluding Orlando" because having a World Convention in a location like Orlando is an unusual event and not something that will be repeated this cycle.)

We were able to keep many expenses under budget, including travel, World Board, and workgroups; and some expenses exceeded budget, including personnel, overhead, and the category labeled literature production and distribution travel and exchange expenses. All of the allocated expenses-Accounting, Personnel, Overhead, and Technology-came in at more than 10% over budget, but the dollar amounts for technology and accounting are not significant. This is simply an indicator that fixed expenses have increased over the last two years. The personnel costs for 2019 were 11%, or \$418,942, over budget, and overhead was 17%, or \$352,334, over the budgeted amount. The line item under fixed operational expenses, which is literature production and distribution travel and exchange expenses, came in \$153,617, over budget due to an ever-changing economy around the world and activities to standardize literature production in Russia.

Independent Auditors' Report

NAWS contracts with an independent accounting firm to audit its financial statements each fiscal year. The audit team spends about a week in the Chatsworth office after the close of each fiscal year, during which they perform transaction tests, inspect internal controls, and scrutinize internal financial practices. This professional audit of NAWS' financial reports and practices conforms to best practices in the world of accounting and complies with the legal requirements for nonprofits. To audit the financial activities of WSO Iran, we have to hire an accounting firm in Iran that provides its audit to our US-based auditors. While this gives management and the Board verified figures for all branch offices, it drastically slows down the process.

INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT

To the World Board of Narcotics Anonymous World Services, Inc.

We have audited the accompanying consolidated financial statements of Narcotics Anonymous World Services, Inc. (a nonprofit organization) which comprise the consolidated statements of financial position as of June 30, 2019, 2018, and 2017, and the related consolidated statements of activities, functional expenses, and cash flows for the years then ended, and the related notes to the consolidated financial statements.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these consolidated financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these consolidated financial statements based on our audits. We did not audit the financial statements of Payam Omega (the official business name of the Iran service office), which statements reflect total assets of \$818,936 and \$921,634 as of June 30, 2018 and 2017, respectively, and net revenues of \$261,182 and \$224,450, respectively, for the years then ended. Those statements were audited by other auditors whose report has been furnished to us, and our opinion, insofar as it relates to the amounts included for Payam Omega, is based solely on the report of the other auditors. We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the consolidated financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the consolidated financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the consolidated financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the consolidated financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our qualified audit opinion.

To the World Board of Narcotics Anonymous World Services, Inc.

Basis for Qualified Opinion

We did not audit the financial statements of Payam Omega as of and for the year ended June 30, 2019, and they were not audited by other auditors due to declining relations between Iran and the United States of America. We were unable to obtain sufficient appropriate audit evidence about the amounts recognized for the Iran service office as of and for the year ended June 30, 2019. Consequently, we were unable to determine whether any adjustments to those amounts were necessary.

Qualified Opinion

In our opinion, except for the possible effects of the matter described in the Basis for Qualified Opinion paragraph, the consolidated financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Narcotics Anonymous World Services, Inc. as of June 30, 2019, 2018, and 2017, and the changes in its net assets and its cash flows for the years then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statement

Independent Auditors' Report Years Ended June 2019, 2018, and 2017

NOTE 1 - ORGANIZATION AND NATURE OF ACTIVITIES

Narcotics Anonymous World Services, Inc. (NAWS) was incorporated on January 25, 1977 and is headquartered in Chatsworth, California. In addition, NAWS operates literature distribution facilities in India and Toronto, Canada, and offices in Brussels, Belgium, and Iran. NAWS' Iranian service office is known as Payam Omega. NAWS is a not-for-profit organization that provides communications and information for the Fellowship of Narcotics Anonymous (NA). NAWS achieves its purpose by maintaining correspondence with NA groups and service committees, by printing and distributing World Services Conference (WSC) approved literature, and by maintaining the archives and files of NA.

In 1993, NA established the Fellowship Intellectual Property Trust (the Trust). The Trust was established for the purpose of holding and administering all recovery material and other intellectual properties of NA. The Trust is included in the consolidated financial statements of NAWS as a result of common control.

NAWS is exempt from income tax under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code and under the California Revenue and Taxation Code. The Trust is also exempt under the applicable Internal Revenue Code and comparable California Revenue and Taxation Code. In addition, the Internal Revenue Service has determined that NAWS and the Trust are not private foundations within the meaning of Section 509(a) of the Internal Revenue Code. Therefore, no provision for federal and state income taxes was made for either NAWS or the Trust.

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

- A. Consolidation Policy and Basis of Accounting: The accompanying consolidated financial statements include the accounts of NAWS and the Trust. Significant intercompany balances and transactions are eliminated in consolidation. The consolidated financial statements are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.
- B. Financial Statement Presentation: Under U.S. generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP) not-for-profit organizations are required to report net assets in two classes: net assets with donor restrictions and net assets without donor restrictions. As of June 30, 2019, 2018 and 2017, NAWS had no net assets with donor restrictions.
- C. Cash and Cash Equivalents: NAWS considers short-term investments with initial maturities of 90 days or less held in bank and brokerage accounts to be cash equivalents.
- D. Investments: NAWS investments are reported at fair value. Investments include certificates of deposit, equities and government securities. See Note 5.
- E. Inventory: Publications and other items held for resale are included in inventory and are carried at the lower of cost or net realizable value. Cost for each item is determined using the weighted average method.
- F. Property and Equipment: Leasehold improvements and furniture and equipment are recorded at cost. Major additions are capitalized while replacements, maintenance and repairs that do not improve or extend the useful life of the asset are expensed. Depreciation and amortization are computed using the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the related assets, which are as follows:

Leasehold improvements

5 years

Furniture and equipment

5 - 10 years

Depreciation and amortization expense related to property and equipment for the years ended June 30, 2019, 2018, and 2017 amounted to \$166,350, \$146,838 and \$150,492, respectively.

- G. Trademarks and Copyrights: The cost of acquiring and defending copyrights and trademarks is capitalized and is amortized over the approximate economic life of the copyright or trademark, which is estimated to be ten years. The cost of computer software is also capitalized and amortized over a period of seven years. Amortization expense related to trademarks and copyrights for the years ended June 30, 2019, 2018 and 2017 amounted to \$205,312, \$197,378 and \$174,195, respectively.
- H. Accounts Receivable and Allowance for Doubtful Accounts: Accounts receivable are reported net of an allowance for doubtful accounts. The allowance is based on management's estimate of the amount of receivables that will actually be collected. Management estimates uncollectible accounts based on the age of the receivable and other factors.

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

- I. Translation of Foreign Financial Statements: Financial operations in Canada, Europe and the Middle East are translated throughout the year to United States dollars. Gains or losses resulting from translating foreign currency financial statements are recorded in the consolidated statements of functional expenses as currency conversion.
- J. Estimates: The preparation of financial statements in conformity with GAAP requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. Actual results could differ from those estimates.
- K. Functional Allocation of Expenses: The costs of providing NAWS' programs and other activities are reported by both their natural and functional classifications in the statements of functional expenses. Expenditures that can be identified with a specific program or supporting service are allocated directly according to their purpose. Costs that are common to more than one function are allocated among the applicable programs and supporting services based on estimates of employee time, using percentages that represent hours spent or wages, or upon estimates of other resources spent.
- L. Tax Status: GAAP requires management to evaluate tax positions taken by NAWS and recognize a tax liability if NAWS has taken a tax position that more likely than not would not be sustained upon examination by a tax authority. NAWS is subject to routine audits by taxing jurisdictions; however, there are currently no audits for any tax periods in progress.
- M. New Accounting Pronouncement: The Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) recently issued ASU 2016-14 *Presentation of Financial Statements of Not-for-Profit Entities*. ASU 2016-14 provides that nonprofit organizations, among other things:
 - Present amounts for two net asset classes in the financial statements rather than three;
 - Provide enhanced disclosures about:
 - Amounts and purposes of board designations;
 - Qualitative information about the management of liquid resources available to meet cash needs for one year;
 - ° Quantitative information about the availability of financial assets to meet cash needs for one year;
 - ° Expenses by both their natural and functional classifications;
 - Methods used to allocate costs among program and support functions;
 - Underwater endowment funds;
 - Report investment return net of investment expenses; and
 - Use the placed-in-service approach for reporting expirations of restrictions on gifts of cash or other assets to be used to acquire or construct long-lived asset.

ASU 2016-14 is effective for fiscal years beginning after December 15, 2017. Earlier application is permitted. The amendment is applied retrospectively to all periods presented. NAWS adopted ASU 2016-14 for the year ended June 30, 2019.

N. Reclassifications: Certain balances in NAWS' consolidated financial statements as of and for the years ended June 30, 2017 and 2018 have been reclassified to conform to the presentation used in its consolidated financial statements for the year ended June 30, 2019.

NOTE 3 - RETIREMENT PLAN

NAWS maintains a qualified defined contribution retirement plan, which covers all employees. Under the terms of the plan, employees may elect to contribute pre-tax earnings up to the maximum allowable amount under the Internal Revenue Code. NAWS matches deferrals of up to 8% of compensation (5% through December 31, 2017) based on the employee's number of years of service. NAWS contributions totaled \$133,942, \$99,335 and \$75,750 for the years ended June 30, 2019, 2018 and 2017, respectively.

NOTE 4 - COMMITMENTS AND CONTINGENCIES

NAWS has entered into various lease agreements for the use of office equipment and facilities. The following is a schedule of future minimum rental payments required under leases that have initial or remaining noncancelable lease terms in excess of one year as of June 30, 2019:

Total payments made under the leases during the years ended June 30, 2019, 2018 and 2017 were \$761,308, \$805,779 and \$966,155, respectively.

NAWS holds equipment not in operation as of June 30, 2019 and makes payments on the original lease. The present value of future minimum payments is reported as a liability in the statements of financial position.

NOTE 5 - INVESTMENTS

GAAP establishes a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes valuation inputs into three levels based on the extent to which inputs used in measuring fair value are observable in the market:

- Level 1 Inputs are quoted prices in an active market.
- Level 2 Inputs are quoted prices for similar instruments and model-based valuation techniques for which all significant assumptions are observable in the market or can be corroborated by observable market data.
- Level 3 Inputs are generally unobservable and typically reflect management's estimates of assumptions that market participants would use in pricing the asset or liability.

NOTE 6 - CONCENTRATIONS OF CREDIT RISK

NAWS places its cash and cash equivalents with high quality financial institutions. Cash in U.S. banks is covered by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC) up to \$250,000 per bank. Cash in Canadian accounts is insured up to \$100,000 (CAD) per bank. At June 30, 2019, deposits in U.S. institutions exceeded insurance limits by \$225,003 and deposits in Canadian banks exceeded insurance limits by \$282,084 (CAD). Cash in European accounts is not covered and totaled approximately \$410,776 (USD) as of June 30, 2019.

Assets reported in the statement of financial position as of June 30, 2019 include cash totaling \$295,016 and publication inventory of \$510,169 at Payam Omega. Due to current relations between Iran and the United States, it is unlikely that NAWS could transfer such assets out of Iran; accordingly their use is limited to Iranian operations.

NOTE 7 - EMPLOYMENT CONTRACT

NAWS has entered into an employment agreement with its Executive Director. The agreement provides for compensation and benefits and expires on December 31, 2021. Should the agreement be terminated by NAWS, certain amounts would be payable to the Executive Director as defined in the agreement. Such amounts have not been accrued as of June 30, 2019.

NOTE 8 - AVAILABILITY OF FINANCIAL ASSETS

As of June 30, 2019, NAWS had \$3,101,728 of financial assets consisting of cash, cash equivalents, and liquid investments available to meet cash needs for general expenditures. None of these financial assets is subject to donor or contractual restrictions that make them unavailable for expenditure within one year of the balance sheet date. NAWS's goal is to maintain cash and liquid investments on hand to meet at least one year's worth of anticipated operating expenses and a policy to structure its financial assets to be available as its general expenditures and liabilities come due.

NOTE 9 - SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

Management has evaluated subsequent events through January 21, 2020, the date these financial statements were available to be issued. There were no material subsequent events that require recognition or additional disclosure in these financial statements.
